To be sure, the United States took nearly sixteen million men and several thousand women into uniform, fielded a ninety-division ground force, floated a two-ocean navy, built a gigantic strategic bomber fleet, and suffered military deaths.

Vitamin deficiencies and malnutrition were prevalent. The Japanese tried to reshape schools and impose the Japanese language. As the Soviet leader Joseph Stalin cynically but accurately observed, the United States adhered to a policy of fighting with American money, and American machines, and Russian men. Apart from granting both youngsters and adults a feeling of closeness and war the mother had, as it were, two apparently contradictory functions: she was an agent of socialization with the surrounding society in everything relating to culture, customs, manners and education, and hence an agent of change,

but at the same time she was responsible for preserving Jewish identity via family customs, Sabbath Shabbatholidays and the like.
